# LETTER FROM THE PRESIDENT

In my first President's letter, I paid tribute to my exceptional predecessor, Roger Davies. Roger was elected President Emeritus for his brilliant leadership and immense efforts in supporting BWS for three decades after he left BWS, through the OWA and the School Rebuild Committee. Sadly, all too suddenly, in January 2008, Roger passed away. Our thoughts and condolences are with his wife Jane, daughter Arabella, parents and brother Alan an OWA member, as is his father.

In my first letter too, I expressed concerns that the OWA might need to close, because we had difficulty recruiting Committee members. Albeit, I had calculated a population of five to seven thousand Old Wordswothians somewhere out there! Unfortunately we have few records of who they are, and, equally important, where they are now!

So I asked you the question - do you think the OWA should continue? Almost immediately, I received 16 replies from several 'corners of the earth'. Contributions ranged over an 80-year span - from Leonard Coombe (1926-35), son of 'Dickie' Coombe, Maths Master at BWS from 1915-59, to Max Rigden (1999-2006). All replies requested and encouraged that the OWA continue, which was most heartening for your Committee, all of whom supported our continuance. Many useful ideas came forward, several of which your Committee have yet to pursue. One of our American-based OWAs, Dickon Pownall-Gray (1968-73) kindly donated \$1,000 to the OWA, to create a functional and flexible database.

I also asked for four more members to serve on the OWA Committee. We recruited two new members at the 2007 AGM, Robert (Bob/Pobble) W Naish (1951-59) and Chris G Cochrane (1956–62), whose (CV) summaries follow in this issue - they are likely to be taking key roles for us next year – plus David (Dave) J King (1948-54) who has just been co-opted onto the Committee. We now have nine members but we would greatly appreciate some younger OWA members to join us.

The OWA's financial situation has significantly improved. At the end of Financial Year 2007/08 our Available Reserves had reached £8.5k compared with only £2.5k, just two years ago. Our Treasurer, Ian R White has done excellent work during the last three years, including giving our figures an electronic base, thus making life easier for his successor. This financial result, together with BWS offering to probably provide an administration service for the OWA - as we had a decade ago - and with our larger working Committee, I am confident that we shall achieve significantly more in the next academic year, than we have in the last two.

One of the enjoyments of attending OWA Committee meetings, is hearing directly from the Headmaster, about the developments in the School, covering the investment programmes and pursuit of grants, the new buildings, and the academic and sporting successes. In this issue of the OWA Newsletter, I particularly wish to draw your attention to the Headmaster's comments on communication with OWs. He is seeking to build an electronic database to reach all OWs. The OWA applauds, and has supported this initiative, by passing our database of paid-up members, to BWS. I do hope you will join in the hunt for names of Head Boys. I can remember four during my six years at BWS – in 1956, the year I left, it was David Delaney and prior to that, David Happold, Chris Potter, and Nick Milne – can you beat that?

BWS' performances at its core sports, continues to be outstanding, but one field-sport where the OWA is prepared to risk challenging BWS, is golf. For the last three years, on the day before Founder's Day, we have played a match and, believe it or not, according to organiser lan White, the OWA is ahead in wins!?! Bob Naish has taken over captaincy this year, and would appreciate hearing from players, both old and new, who want to meet the challenge from BWS.

The OWA, with its huge time-span of members, is not a Club, as such, but a frame work able to foster groups of peers for, among other activities, occasional gatherings. I recommend you view Stephen Quigley's comments to his peers, as he encourages them to join him on Founder's Day, which is two weeks later than usual because of the Cathedral's 750<sup>th</sup> anniversary celebrations. Also, Chris Cochrane is seeking your interest in an OWA lunch in the Cathedral Close followed by a Trip up the Spire.

I am pleased to report that one of our OWA members, Roy Froud, wrote to the Headmaster, asking to have refurbished, the Second World War Memorial plaque, located in the School Chapel. This shows a list of OWs who 'fell' in the Second World War to go alongside the one previously erected, which lists those who lost their life in The Great War, the war to end all wars! We are delighted that the Headmaster has recently had this work done, and those of you attending Founder's Day, will have the chance to see that the names can be read more clearly. It is not just a tribute to brave men, but a reminder to both present day pupils and OWs, of their unique heritage.

Finally, I drive the round trip of 320 miles from Swynnerton in Staffordshire to No 11 The Close, to attend OWA Committee meetings, at least five times a year. Several of my fellow Committee members travel similar distances. I admit that I have the added attraction of staying with one of my two sisters that live in the Salisbury area; but nevertheless, it is a long way and so, occasionally, I question my purpose. Why do I do it? I feel that BWS gave all of us, a second-to-none platform of education and personal development, that has stood us in good stead, as we have progressed along our unique career paths. BWS is our roots, and we are very proud of it. We wish to say "Thank you" to BWS - in as many ways as we are able-whilst enjoying the friendship of those who share such roots.

#### Responses from OWs to President's Question, in Newsletter Summer 2007.

Do you think the OWA should continue? It was the guestion I asked you, last year.

I had 16 replies from OWs, whose School Dates spanned an amazing 75 years. These came from Leonard Coombe (1926–35), Gordon Hickish (1936-43), Mike Safe (1945-52), Michael Roger (1945-53), David Happold (1947-55), David King (1948-54), John Mumford (1950-55), Derek Brice (1950-57), Nigel Musset (1958-61), Trevor Hursthouse (1958-64), Patrick Hillman (1959-1966), Dickon Pownall-Gray (1968-73), Ray Bell (1971-78), Julian Paisley (1982-89), Sebastian Stuart (1998-2005), and Max Rigden (1999-2006).

All were extremely positive about the OWA continuing, and many said they would have offered their services as Committee members, if they live nearer to Salisbury, or lived in this Country, or lived on this side of the Globe!

Most promised to contact OWs whose whereabouts were still known, and seek to interest them. Some raised the suggestion of leavers-year gatherings or similar time- gatherings. Arthur (Titch) Bowden, former BWS Pupil and Master, then OWA President, Chairman, Secretary and general factotum, sent me a 1956 Beginners-Year reunion list, arranged by Stuart Keppie.

Some provided good ideas of how to develop the OWA including

- Dickon Pownall-Gray, in Weston, Connecticut, who suggested producing a video of the School today, which could be compacted to a size suitable for e-mail, and offered to help the Association with this idea. Then, he kindly donated \$1,000 towards the cost of setting up a comprehensive e-mail data base, which we are seeking to do in conjunction with the School.
- Ray Bell suggested using Friends Reunited for finding contacts, which our Membership Secretary has been doing for the past four years. Ray has suggested identifiying one OW, from each year of leaving, to be a conduit to send the OWA's messages. We have already used and found a large number of OWs and contacted many, but there is still much work to do in this area.

Some OWs provided other snippets of interest. I will share a couple with you:

- Leonard Coombe, now in his early 90s, saw, in our Newsletter, the obituary of Robert Blackledge, BWS Headmaster from1964-74. Leonard had taught him when he was a Master at Plymouth College. Leonard also reminded me of his father Richard H, the famous Dickie Coombe, Master at BWS from 1915-59 in Mathematics. Yes, Leonard, he did teach me B1, A1, and IL1 and, I estimate, at least 5 thousand more OWs? And thanks to Dickie, I took Maths at honours level in my engineering degree. [additional rider from OWA Hon Treasurer Ian White (1952 1959). Dickie taught me to the day we eaxch left BWS, and he taught my father Eric, BWS pupil from 1918 to 1925, as did Fuzz Richards who also taught both of us].
- Dr David Happold is now a visiting Fellow at the Australian National University in Canberra. David was a Head Boy during my early years at BWS but, more relevant, he was son of Dr 'Freddie' Happold, one of BWS' longest-serving Headmasters, and, yes, the one that 'straighten me out' with 'six of the best'. David kindly commiserated with me for he, too, had suffered the same fate! I had always been ashamed to admit it but now, David, maybe we should start an elite club? Are there more members?

Finally may I say a big "Thank you", to all of you who have written, from near and far, with your advice, comments and praise, not just about the OWA, but also BWS,. # New Committee Members - 2007-2008

Chris Cochrane. PhD, FIEE (1956 – 62)



After graduating in Aeronautical Engineering, Chris was an RAF Engineering Officer on Vulcan bombers, then a Signals Officer in the Far East. In 1970, he helped establish the new Skynet 1 satellite communications network. He was twice Skynet desk officer in Whitehall, also Satcom Liaison Officer in Washington.

Chris joined Marconi, Portsmouth in 1982, to lead development of the Skynet 4 Ground Control Facility, then was promoted Division Manager for Spacecraft Subsystems. After a merger with Matra Espace, he became UK General Manager for Earth Observation and Science, responsible for development of the ENVISAT Synthetic Aperture Radar and the Solar Heliospheric Observatory (SOHO), amongst other projects.

In 1997, he joined the MoD as a Research Manager. From 2001, he was Science Advisor on Imaging Technology, chairing the MoD's Radar Tower of Excellence, and the IEE's Professional Group for Aerospace.

Chris retired from the MoD in 2004, to lecture on Planetary Science, and continue his research of Venus at Imperial College. He is also a Technology Board member of the Defence Scientific Advisory Council.

# Robert W (Bob) Naish (a.k.a. "Pobble") (1951-1959) Who Me?

That extended tenure may attract a number of interpretations, none flattering; perhaps I peaked academically at the 11+!

Friends and associates? There were so many- honestly; in the main school I remember Dave Jugg, Pete Gallagher, Les Ruddle, Pete Brown and many others: In the 6<sup>th</sup> Form years there were Owen Pearce, Martin Sexton, Keith Charlton, Lee Curtis, Andy Bellars etc etc. I was in the Biology group with "Barnaby" Rudge.

As for activities well: I played in every level of rugby team including a barnstorming 1<sup>st</sup> XV in 1958-59 led by Eric Webb. I also had flirtations with the Cross-Country VIII with some famous names like Blake, Brown, and Ralls; with Intermediate athletics and the 2<sup>nd</sup>. Cricket eleven. Culturally, I sang in the Choral Society for years and the Chapel choir in my later years as a bass.

Eventually I had to leave of course, and after a couple of false starts, I popped into Nottingham University for a degree in agriculture (Hons. of course). I shared some of my time and space there with OWs, Archie Wimblett and Chris Surman, but I've met neither since graduating.

There followed 29 years with Ministry of AG Fish & Food as an Agricultural Advisor in a range of topics and locations. The latter included a three year spell in the heady atmosphere of Mandarins and Make Believe in Whitehall. I finally landed back here in the West Country in 1976, and three jobs later including the management of a couple of Regional Departments,

retired from the M.A.F.F. in 1993. Well, we were rather being mucked about at that time by Management Consultants and Progressive Zealots, whose professional visions I could not share.

Retirement at 53 years of age did seem a bit extreme, so I became a free-lance Consultant. An interesting and enjoyable career change, which still continues, though somewhat low key, to this day. Much of this new work has taken me overseas, especially to the countries of Eastern Europe, providing training and skills in things agricultural, especially business organisation and management.

Finally, why haven't I mentioned Sir William (Scruff) Golding, like all other '50s OWs do? After all, was I not the model for Jack in LoTF? The truth is, I am ashamed of not recognising Scruff for what he was at the time. I thought he was a rather untidy bloke, who spent his time writing, when he should have been teaching me the difference between a Gerund and Geronimo. Blooming cheek. Think how good a writer I might have been, with the proper academic nourishment. But I will say this for him and his books; my tangential association with the great man proved to be an excellent ice-breaker with many of the people I worked with overseas, especially the interpreters who all seemed to have read him.

#### The Headmaster writes

The dappling of the sunshine across my office windows marks the emergence of the No 11 garden from the dormancy of Spring; more prosaically, that means that the time for another examination season is upon us, the majority of yet another school year is past and it is time to introduce the 2008 OWA Newsletter.

How will 2007-2008 be remembered in the life of the School? It has been a year of continued expansion, both in the size of the Sixth Form, and the quality and breadth of what we can offer to the boys here – and quality and breadth in what they have achieved as a result. We have worked hard at improving the learning environment by creating (perhaps for the first time) some superb specialist Technology facilities. The Spencer Williams Technology Block, completed and opened in October 2007, offers two fully equipped teaching rooms together with excellent ICT facilities, plus office and storage facilities. The next improvement projects will focus on No 11 and Bishopgate. We have secured £150,000 to refurbish the two oldest parts of the school's estate. We also have a major bid in preparation for a further Sixth Form teaching block – this will be submitted in September to the Learning & Skills Council. If successful, it will offer us the additional rooms that we require for the extra youngsters arriving for post-16 studies – and (again for the first time) offer some dedicated Sixth Form space worthy of the name!

2007-2008 was the year when we adopted a second 'specialist' area of operation. From April 2008 Bishop's became a Science specialist centre, due recognition of the centre of excellence that the school has been for many years in this area of the curriculum. A flow of additional resources into the school will mean that we will be able to enhance delivery of curricular Science, expand extra curricular provision and work with other schools and industry, to make Science better for young people across the local area. Because of this initiative, we will be able to create an additional eighth lab in the Science Block, and we aim to do further work during 2008-2009 to improve teaching facilities still further. And while Science was an exciting new area of expansion, our outstandingly successful languages provision broadened horizons both within the Close Walls, and with the 12+ primary schools throughout the city with whom we now work.

So yes, it has been a year of sustained development and progress, but all of this is built upon some really pleasing levels of success in the more 'routine' areas of school life. The boys continue to excel academically across the board. Perhaps one of the most pleasing outcomes is the record number of Oxbridge offers, received this year (16 conditional offers of places). Sport, Music and Drama were real strengths, with boys achieving great things and having an enjoyable time while they do them. The collaboration with SWGS also continued to thrive, and brought an extra dimension to both schools.

Finally, I can bring you up to date with an initiative that I hope will be a rolling programme to consolidate some of the school's heritage over the next few years. This year I have commissioned an Oxford and Cambridge Honours Board, which now hangs proudly at the foot of the steps to the Chapel. The board covers the period from 1992 to the present, and I will be delving back into the school records to find out more information for previous years. I have also begun to build a list of former Head Boys with the same intention in mind; thus far I have almost complete coverage from 1932-1969 and 1992-present. If you can provide any further names/dates etc please do get in touch with the school to let me know (admin@bws.wilts.sch.uk). In future I intend to go on to Captains of Rugby etc, thus ensuring that the records of the outstanding achievements of previous years can be seen by the boys and the OWs for years to come.

# MINUTES OF THE OWA ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING, STAFF COMMON ROOM, BISHOP WORDSWORTH'S SCHOOL ON SATURDAY 7 JULY 2007 START 1pm

## 1 Welcome by the President

The President welcomed the twenty members attending the AGM and their guests.

#### 2 Apologies for Absence

Apologies for absence had been received from Peter Bound, Chris Hale, David Redway and Peter Wilson

# 3 Minutes of the AGM held on 8 July 2006

The minutes were approved and signed by the President.

# 4 Matters Arising

None

# 5 President's report for 2006/07

The President, Keith Ralls, reported the good news, that the charity had £4.5k in reserves, but that the Association had struggled throughout the last year with no Administrator, no Hon. Secretary, and the Chairman, with a demanding job and young family, had found it difficult to attend all meetings. All this, together with a lack of new committee members, had forced the Committee to consider closing the OWA, but had decided to continue if it can. President reported that his request for help and suggestions in The Old Wordsworthians' Summer Newsletter, had produced 15 replies, with positive comments, which he will assimilate all the suggestions, and report back in the next Newsletter. A donation of \$1000 had been received, specifically to build up the electronic database of members.

The President thanked Roger Davies, who is retiring from the Committee, for the huge contribution he had made to the OWA, spanning nearly thirty years. He also thanked him for preparing the paper, detailing the constitutional changes proposed under item 7.

The President thanked the Treasurer, Ian White for all his work and for organising the OWA team for the golf match against the School the previous day.

# 6 Hon Treasurer's Report and audited accounts for 2006/07

The Hon. Treasurer presented the accounts for the year. These had been approved by the Executive Committee of Trustees, and audited by Fawcetts, Chartered Accountants.

Ian White explained that the costs are not as high as last year, because there had been no paid Administrator in that position. Practically, this had meant there had been no Winter Newsletter, and so no subscription reminder. He hoped to issue a letter shortly to draw in non cheque payers. He explained that the monies held in the CAF Gold Account were the subscriptions paid by parents, when their son/s join BWS, and are ring-fenced in case the OWA folds.

The President congratulated the Hon Treasurer on his report and said that a summary would be included in the next Newsletter.

In response to a question about sponsorship, the Hon Treasurer said that if boys approach the OWA for funding towards a particular project, the Committee first seek the advice of the Head. Provision is made in the Constitution for the awarding of gifts to pupils.

Acceptance of the Report and Accounts were proposed by Roy Froud, seconded by Stephen Quigley, and carried unanimously.

#### 7 Election to the Executive Committee of Trustees for 2007/08

Roger Davies introduced the report and explained the reasons for a proposed reduction in the number of Officers and ordinary members, to serve on the Committee in 2007/08, and to propose the names of members who have been nominated, and indicated their willingness to serve on the Committee in 2007/08.

The principal problem which needed to be addressed, was that there was great difficulty in getting members to come forward to serve on the Committee, and this meant that the Committee was in danger of becoming 'inquorate', and thus in breach of its constitution as

registered with the Charity Commission. It was necessary to reduce the minimum numbers, so that the Committee should henceforth be no more than 10 members, and no fewer that six members, and such that an attendance of three members, would constitute a quorum at a meeting.

It was further proposed to delete the positions of Vice-President, and Chairman and Vice-Chairman, of the Executive Committee, so that in future the President, or his nominee, would chair the meetings of the Executive Committee of Trustees.

The following changes to the Constitution were proposed by Ian White, seconded by Philip Kennedy, and were resolved unanimously for immediate implementation and notification to the Charity Commission:

- That Clause 5 (d) (iii) be amended to read that (at an AGM) there shall be 'election from among the full membership of a President, an Honorary Secretary, an Honorary Treasurer and Membership Secretary, and such other Honorary Officers as the Association shall from time to time decide. No one person may hold more than one office simultaneously, or any office for more than three consecutive years, save with the specific consent of the Association at an AGM or EGM.'
- That Clause 5 (d) (iv) be amended to read that (at an AGM) there shall be 'election of other members to the Executive Committee of Trustees' so as to provide for a total membership of the Committee not exceeding 10 members and not fewer than six members.'
- That Clause 7 (a) be similarly amended to refer to 'a Committee membership of not less than six nor more than 10 members'.
- That Clause 7 (i) be amended to read as follows: 'The attendance of three Committee members with voting rights, shall constitute a quorum at meetings. No business may be transacted unless a quorum be present.'
- That Clause 9 (a) and (b) be consolidated to provide as follows:
   'The President or his nominee shall chair the AGM and any EGM and meetings of the Executive Committee of Trustees'.

There being no other nominations, the aforesaid members indicated above, were unanimously elected.

# 8 Appointment of Auditors for 2007/2008

On a proposal by Ian White, seconded by Norman Barter, it was agreed to appoint Fawcetts as auditors for 2007/2008.

# 9 Any Other Business

A presentation of the golf trophy was made by Lee Duckett, a master at BWS, to Ian White, following the victory of the OWA golf team over that of BWS the previous day.

A suggestion was made, to include the AGM minutes in the next Newslette,r and the President said this would be considered.

lan White mentioned that the School had made an offer to provide an escorted tour for OWs of No 11 at Founders Day next year, and a mention of this would be made in next year's booking form, to ascertain what level of interest there would be and whether a tour would be worthwhile. Next Founder's Day would be held on Saturday 19 July 2008.

He was in the vestry with sound test gear, together with all his colleagues, manning the stations *en route* to the BBC Studios, whether Bristol or London, to ensure the sound broadcasts would succeed. This involved the setting up and testing, of the music line before-hand, and attendance during the actual broadcast. The circuits for music broadcast had to occupy a much larger bandwidth, than the ordinary telephone lines at that time, and had a much lower noise level. Therefore, this needed specialist treatment at all the BBC stations. These broadcasts occurred many times in the summer months of 1958, and, thankfully, there were no failures.

**Julian Paisley 1982-1989** is working for the Export Credits Divison of the Organisation for Economic Cooperation and Development, and was appalled that the OWA might close. He says "A School, such as BWS, should have an active and supporting O W Association. I would volunteer for the OWA Committee, but am currently working and living in Paris, which makes attending meetings 'a little difficult' somewhat".

Rafael McDonnell 1979-1986 now lives in Chalfont St Giles in Buckinghamshire, married to Melanie (formerly Barrett from South Wilts Grammar School) and has two boys and a little girl. He now runs his own marketing company (RED Entertainment Marketing), which provides entertainment marketing solutions for brands including Coca-Cola. This follows his career of working in marketing with Fosters lager, Walkers crisps, and later, six years at Coca-Cola running all of their Strategic Marketing Alliances & Activation.

Richard (Rag) Wilson 1961-1969 was elected as a Borough Councillor in Woking in May 2007, and serves on the Council's planning and standards committees. Richard is also a school governor at his daughter's school, Heathside School in Weybridge and at his son's junior school in his home village, West Byfleet. Scouting continues in his life, now moving on to be a County Scout Network Leader in Surrey, whilst his wife, Camilla, is County Secretary for Surrey Scouts. Richard's brother Peter Wilson 1964-1970 lives in nearby Leatherhead, and is a Captain with British Airways. His son is also a pilot with BA.

**Tony Penny 1968-1975** is still serving with the Royal Navy, in naval engineering, & currently working in the MOD Defence Procurement Agency in Bristol. Married to Sara, has 3 children.

**Trevor Hursthouse 1958-64** advises that he started his career with NatWest, finishing up as Executive Vice President for corporate finance in New York City, until the business was acquired by another bank in 1996. Since then he has worked for a printing firm, specializing in print materials for financial organizations, and for three years ran a financially-troubled non-profit business. From April 2006 he has been working for the worldwide systems group of KPMG (the accounting, tax and advisory firm). He has lived in the USA for the last 23 years. Trevor made it over the Atlantic to Founder's Day last year, and attended our AGM.

Roger Davies 1958 - 1965. I first met Roger, when he was President who, very successfully, organised the OWA Centenary Dinner, at Salisbury Racecourse. This was the start of my becoming more involved with the OWA, thanks mainly to Roger's enthusiasm for the Association & I was elected to the Committee soon afterwards. It is not just the OWA that this School benefited from Roger's involvement. He was instrumental, along with many fellow OWs, in fighting off the then Government's proposals for the scrapping of BWS as a Grammar School, and served the committee responsible for the Re-build of BWS, such that we can see the evidence of these efforts in the new parts of the School to-day. Roger served the OWA in more positions than most OWs, except or including Arthur Bowden, as he was Secretary, Chairman of the Committee, Vice-Chairman & President for more years than most. He rewrote the Constitution, proposed & succeeded in turning the OWA into a Registered Charity. His concern about the validity & viable structure of the OWA in to-day's world of continuous financial crisis, meant that each member of the Committee was constantly focused on the tasks in hand. In all the years he served on the Committee, Roger rarely missed a meeting, for many years travelling from his home in Twickenham to Salisbury in the evenings, before he eventually retired to Salisbury. It is a very sincere "Thank you" that we owe, for the continuing presence of the OWA. Over these past five years or so, Roger has, singlehandedly most of the time, edited, had printed then compiled, & arranged for the despatch of, our Newsletters. Without his guidance this time, this Newsletter will be sent out later than usual. His contribution at Committee meetings, & close liaison with respective Headmasters, ensured that the OWA played, & continues to play, a co-operative role with the School. This was evidenced on 1 February when St Martin's Church was full with fellow OWA members. both previous Administrators whom Roger had engaged on behalf of the OWA, Headmaster, his PA & several staff as well as Mr Clive Barnett, our previous Head. In January of this year, I was absolutely stunned, as I felt personally, that Roger was a great friend, as well as a person I thoroughly enjoyed speaking to, & in whose company, he always brought a smile. lan White
